Commemorative activities and events in celebration of the centennial anniversary of writer Jose Maria Arguedas (Andahuaylas 1911 – Lima 1969) have been numerous and widespread during the month of January: special supplements in major newspapers, television programs and documentaries devoted to his life and work, round tables in several universities and cultural centers, and popular festivities in diverse regions of Peru. Not only have all cultural and academic institutions felt called to offer their homage, but identification with Arguedas's lifework has transcended the institutional domain, inspiring popular participation, and multiple independent artistic presentations. Even though official negotiations to name 2011 "the year of Arguedas" did not conclude successfully, it is an inescapable fact that his life and work have served as a "mirror" for all Peruvians to recognize themselves in their differences and similarities. Throughout all of these celebrations, the deep desire for equality and for a kind of integration that respects differences has become patent. Peru today is much closer to the country of Arguedas's dreams, more so than the country he left behind when he died in 1969.

It is encouraging, as well, to see events being organized to celebrate Arguedas's centennial in many countries throughout the world. This fact by itself suggests the universal significance of his lifework.

Our upcoming congress, while having an academic focus, will emphasize the fact that the centennial of Jose Maria Arguedas's birth commits us to a deeper reflection about the social transformations we are currently undergoing, and to measure the pulse of inter-cultural encounters in light of the Arguedian legacy.



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AN INTERNATIONAL AND INTERDISCI-PLINARY CONGRESS: MAJOR TOPICS

In light of the Arguedian legacy, this event seeks to explore the dynamics of cultural encounters in contemporary society from an interdisciplinary perspective, while promoting a reflection on the contributions of Andean culture to the global community.

- 6. Contemporary Reception of Arguedas's Work
- 7. Arguedas and the Arts: Music, Poetry, Painting, Drama, Film, Popular Art, Oral Storytelling
- 8. New Approaches to Arguedas's Life Work (Feminism, Phenomenology, Deconstruction, Critical Theory, etc.)
- 9. Documentary Sources about Arguedas
- 10. Arguedas and Pedagogy: Proposals for Education in the 21st Century
- 11. Translation, Transculturation, Transcreation: Challenges of the Arguedian Project
- 12. Arguedas and the Testimonial Genre
- 13. Arguedas's Approaches to the Religious Phenomenon
